8. How do the three "garden experiences" of Jesus support our answer to number seven?
9. What command does Paul give to the saints at Ephesus at the end of his discussion of the Armor of God in Ephesians 6:18-20? Note how Ephesians 1:15-23 and 3:14-19 serve as examples of this principle.
